GOLD STAR MOTHERS WEEKEND IN WASHINGTON DC

Pat Soler, BSMA National President departed California on 27 September 2012 on a Redeye Flight to Washington, D.C. She was scheduled to attend various meetings as well as the Gold Star Mothers National Ceremony. I was at Ronald Reagan National Airport excited and nervous as I awaited her arrival. We had several phone conversations to finalize her trip and also discussed how we were going to link up. This was necessary since we had never meet face-to- face. Like two elated long lost sisters happy to see each other, we exchanged a quick loving hug in the arrival lane at the airport. We loaded the luggage in to the car and set off for D.C. The first task was to find a changing booth for "Super Woman, Pat" to change out of her travel clothes and into her meeting clothes for a busy day of meetings. The first meeting began with Senator's representatives in the Rayburn Room of the US Capitol and the last of five meetings ended in the Hart Senate Office Building. The purpose of the meetings was to introduce and promote the mission and vision of the Blue Star Mothers of America. The next evening, Pat attended the Gold Star Mothers Dinner, After a restful night, we were up early and made our way to the Vietnam Wall. The Gold Star Mothers said a prayer and laid their wreath at the Wall. After that, Pat laid a beautifully arranged red, white and blue floral wreath on behalf of the Blue Star Mothers of America. The Patriot Guard from nearby states showed their support of the ceremony for the very special Mothers and families who were in attendance. Later in the afternoon, we attended the Gold Star Mothers Ceremony near the Amphitheater on the Arlington grounds. Following the ceremony, the Gold Star Mothers laid their wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns. In one of our conversations. Pat had asked me if I would like to assist her in laying the Blue Star Mothers wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns. Speechless for a few moments (due to the lump in my throat and my brain trying to process this request), I said "Yes!"

When it came time for Pat and me to lay our wreath, a Guard announced to the crowd that they would be witnessing a Wreath Ceremony. He also instructed them as to what they would witness and how they should conduct themselves. Pat and I were escorted by a Tomb Guard from the Tomb Museum down the steps until we reached our position in front of the Tomb. When we reached our location, the Tomb Guard assisted us in placing the wreath and guiding us to our position back in front of the Tomb.

All I knew was that this was one of the greatest honors- to lay a wreath honoring the Tomb of the Unknowns and the Gold Star Families' sons and daughters on one of the Nation's most sa-

Blue Star Mothers of Louisiana — LA 5 welcomed home one of their own sons. Tim Sanders, son of James and Angie Sanders was welcomed home with a Hero's welcome.

The airport was filled with Patriot Guard Riders who stood in a flag line in honor of Tim's service. Tim was escorted by the PGR from the airport to his hometown high school in Choudrant La. A reception was waiting for him with family, friends and Blue Star Mothers of Chapter 5 serving cake and punch. Sanders returned from Afghanistan with a number of accolades, including the Purple Heart and three Army Achievement Awards. He plans to dedicate his Purple Heart to his father, James.

Sanders was injured in Afghanistan when a grenade was lobbed

at him and his troops. He couldn't throw the grenade back in time and received wounds to his hands and face.

His actions to protect his fellow troops garnered him the Purple Heart. After sustaining his injuries, Sanders was told he would be flown home, but he declined and remained in Afghanistan. He said he owes his courage to his father. (continued pg3)

So, as soon as the Purple Heart reaches his hands, it will be given to his father. " I want to give it to him. It wasn't that I got hurt, but that I got hurt and returned to the fight two days later. It took courage and a lot out of me to go back. I got all that from my father. He's a good strong man," Tim Sanders said. He's taught me everything I know." Giving his Purple Heart to his Father was suppose to be a secret, but James Sanders said that secret only lasted about 7 days. "I asked why he wanted to give his Purple Heart to me. He said, the only thing that helped him through Afghanistan and everything he's been through was

because he had a praying father who taught him how to seek God.

"I am deeply honored my son would think of me that much," James Sanders said.

A committee of the Continental Congress met at Tun Tavern in

Philadelphia, PA, to draft a resolution calling for two battalions of Marines able to fight for independence at sea and on shore so on November 10, 1775, the Marine Corps was born.



November 11th, 2012 -Veterans Day

November 11th, 2012 -Veterans Day

World War I officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting had ceased seven months earlier when an armistice or temporary cessation of hostilities. between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars" and was originally called Armistice Day. Today, November 11 is called Veterans Day and is observed on November 11, regardless

of what day of the week on which it falls, to preserve the historical significance of the date. Most ceremonies are held at the 11th hour on this 11th day of the 11th month. The purpose of Veterans Day is to focus attention on honoring America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good. We can all go one step further and thank Veterans whenever we see them during the year.
